SACRAMENTS

Reconciliation - Saturdays at 3:00 p.m., Weekdays: 15 minutes prior to Mass or please call the pastor at 255-4600 for an appointment. If you are homebound and unable to come to the Church and need a priest to come to your home for confession, please call 255-4600 to set this up.

Baptism - The Baptism Preparation Program and Baptism Schedule are by arrangement. Please call the parish office at 255-4600 to register prior to your delivery date and the program director will return your call. Parents must be registered at Corpus Christi or have permission from their parish.

Marriage - Couples planning to be married should call the parish office at 255-4600 at least **10 - 12 months** in advance. Completion of required paperwork and taking the FOCCUS premarital inventory is also needed this early. This process is usually administered the fourth Thursday of each month from 7:00-9:00 p.m.

Natural Family Planning Classes are offered by the Bismarck Diocese. The methods offered are Billings Ovulation Method, Creighton Model Fertility Care System, Marquette Model and Sympto-Thermal Methods. 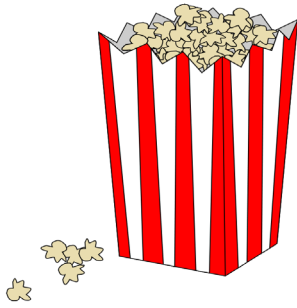

The Holy Father Speaks. . . . Pope Francis returned to the theme of "Christian Hope" in the catechesis during the weekly General Audience. On Wednesday, he focused his attention on the figure of Abram, who became Abraham, our "father in faith and in hope." Saint Paul himself pointed to Abram "to indicate the way of faith and of hope." Abram's confidence in God's promise to give him a son was truly a hope "against ever hope", precisely because of his advanced age, and the sterility of Sara, his wife. But Abram believed, and his faith gave way to a new hope, a hope which, to all appearances was unreasonable. His hope opens new horizons, making him capable of dreaming what is unimaginable. Hope allows us to enter into the darkness of an uncertain future to journey in the light. It is a difficult journey, though. Even Abram had moments of crisis and discouragement. In the Gospel passage, the scene where Abram questions God takes place at night - in the heart of Abram there is the darkness of disappointment, of discouragement. Even though he spoke familiarly with God, Abram in these moments felt alone, old and tired, with death on his doorstep. Pope Francis stated that even this moment of questioning by Abram is a form of Faith. Despite his disappointment, Abram continued to believe in God - or else why would he complain to him? Faith is not only silence that accepts everything without reply, hope is not a certainty that makes you secure from doubts and perplexity. Faith can also be struggling with God, showing our bitterness without 'pious' fictions. Hope is also not being afraid to see reality for what it is and to accept the contradictions. The sign that God gives to Abram - "Look at the heavens and count the stars... just so will your descendants be" - is a call to continue to believe and to hope.

WINTER SAFETY FOR OLDER ADULTS

When the temperature drops, older adults run a higher risk of health problems and injuries related to the weather. If you use a cane to walk outside, make sure that the rubber tip is new and NOT smooth. Ice tip attachments are available.

INJURY WHILE SHOVELING SNOW

- If you choose to or need to shovel, remember that your heart works double time to keep you warm when it is cold outside.
- Strenuous activities like shoveling may put too much strain on your heart, especially if you have heart disease or are otherwise sedentary.
- If you have problems with balance or "thin bones" (osteoporosis), your risk for falling and injury are increased.
- Make sure that you are not holding your breath while "bearing down" to shovel. This "bearing down", called the Valsalva Maneuver, will increase your blood pressure and reduce your oxygen intake at the same time. This is why the risk of heart attack and brain injury is high while shoveling!
- To prevent back injury, bend your knees to scoop the snow and move your legs and feet and turn your body to dump rather than bending over to scoop and twisting your back to dump.
- Ask your health care provider if shoveling is safe for you.

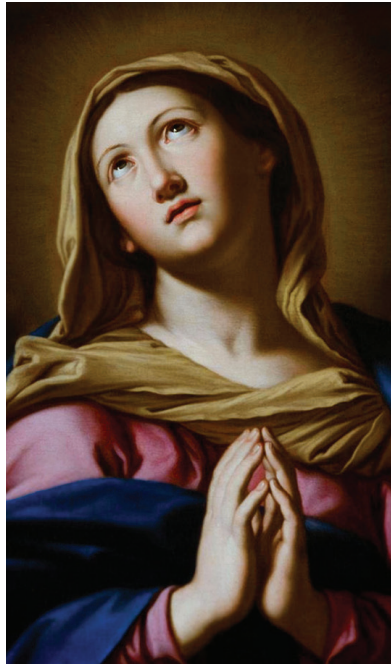

A woman of peace

At least that's what happens in God's way of doing things. Pray for peace today, both for yourself and the world. But don't only pray; do something to help bring peace to conflict.

MONDAY, JANUARY 2 MEMORIAL OF BASIL THE GREAT AND GREGORY NAZIANZEN, BISHOPS AND DOCTORS OF THE CHURCH **Meet the Cappodocians**

How's this for a circle of family and friends: One of the brothers of the fourth-century bishop and theologian Saint Basil was Bishop Gregory of Nyssa. Counted also as saints are Basil's grandmother, father, another of his brothers, and his sister. His good friend was Bishop Gregory of Nazianzus, also remembered today. Basil and his illustrious group came from the Greek region of Cappodocia, which had a tough reputation. They liked to tell the story that when a snake bit a Cappodocian, the snake died. Follow these holy Cappodocians and put some bite in your faith.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John* 2:22-28; *John* 1:19-28 (205). "They said to John, 'Who are you? . . . What do you say about yourself?'"

TUESDAY, JANUARY 3 MEMORIAL OF THE MOST HOLY NAME OF JESUS **What's in a name? Everything**

Do you know the name of the person who delivers your mail? What about the manager of your grocery store or the CEO of your power company? Our automated, electronic, virtual world makes it nearly impossible to have personal contact with people who perform important services for us each day. Yet, amazingly, we know the name of our Divine Savior, whom we are encouraged to call directly for help. We honor the holy name of Jesus because God was revealed to us personally through Jesus, who invited us to share in his life and perform works of love and mercy in his name. What will you do today in the name of Jesus?

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John* 2:29-3:6; *John* 1:29-34 (206). "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world."

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 4 MEMORIAL OF ELIZABETH ANN SETON, RELIGIOUS **A woman for all seasons**

Elizabeth Seton (1774-1821) became a Catholic at 30, after the death of her husband and over the protests of her Episcopalian family and friends. She had always been active in the sup-

port of poor widows and their children, enough to merit her the nickname "the Protestant Sister of Charity." Estranged from her relatives, the now-Catholic Elizabeth banded together with like-minded women to become the Daughters of Charity of St. Joseph. The sisters established orphanages and hospitals, but their commitment to the parochial school system became their renown.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John* 3:7-10; *John* 1:35-42 (207). "We have found the Messiah, which is translated Christ."

THURSDAY, JANUARY 5 MEMORIAL OF JOHN NEUMANN, BISHOP **A penny's worth of good**

Children resist accompanying their parents to places that are no fun for them: the bank, grocery store, or gas station. This list may also include church. Young John Neumann was no different. He wouldn't attend Mass, the rosary, or Stations with his mother unless she sweetened the deal with a penny. Mrs. Neumann got a good return on those pennies! So did the American church. The future bishop would

walk miles to deliver sacraments to a single child—who may have felt similarly uninspired without a penny's worth of investment. Share your faith with a child.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John* 3:11-21; *John* 1:43-51 (208). "Whoever does not love remains in death."

FRIDAY, JANUARY 6 MEMORIAL OF ANDRÉ BESSETTE, RELIGIOUS **Knock and the door will open**

Nearly rejected by his order, the sickly Blessed André Bessette (1845-1937) was finally allowed to become a religious brother. His superiors figured that "if he can't work, at least he'll be good at praying." It turns out he was good at both. Assigned to be the porter—a kind of greeter and errand boy—at Notre Dame college in Montreal, he spent his days listening to the concerns of all who arrived at his door, especially the poor and afflicted. He lived to be 91 and became known for his healings and his devotion to Saint Joseph. Today, pray in his memory to Saint Joseph for your needs or the needs of a loved one.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John* 5:5-13; *Mark* 1:7-11 or *Luke* 3:23-28 (209). "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased."

SATURDAY, JANUARY 7 MEMORIAL OF RAYMOND OF PEÑAFORT, PRIEST **Serve when called**

After his surprise election to be president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in 2010, Archbishop Timothy Dolan of New York quipped, "The posture of the bishops, of course, is you don't really run for office, you run from it." Saint Raymond of Peñafort (1175-1275) would have agreed. A scholar and lawyer, he entered the Dominican order at the relatively late age of 47 and did his best to avoid getting promoted. Sickness kept him from being named an archbishop, but he couldn't get out of becoming general of the Dominicans. There are times you may be asked to step up—like serving on a committee or caring for a relative. Remember that even reluctant leaders can lead!
