Come Lord Jesus! We light this candle to proclaim the coming of the light of God into our darkness. With the coming of this light there is joy, joy that is ours not only at Christmas but always.

Her name was Mary. When Gabriel approached Mary; he called her "favored one." She was precisely that, wasn't she? She was favored, out of all the women on earth, to bear the Christ child. No one has ever been more greatly honored. But why Mary? Could it be that she was chosen because God felt comfortable with her? She knew God intimately: person to Person. God knew her intimately: Person to person. God knew that Mary could be counted on. She was a person of faith, obedient to God. She accepted God's will. And this great faith showed as Mary said, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word. Mary accepted Christ in her body and her heart. In a sense she was the first Christian. She was one who could always sing, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my savior." The question is: Can we do the same?



The blessing of the Christmas Tree. Each Christmas season, as we decorate our tree, we honor the past, remembering with each ornament the years before. And we also make a promise to the future, when this year's tree will be a memory. We circle the tree as a family and weigh its branches with our hopes and dreams. How much more special it will be if we bring our Lord to share this time with us, unifying us in His love, as well as our own. Try for example this simple Christmas tree blessing:

When the family is gathered, start with a simple prayer of thanks for the family members gathered, the roof over your heads, the joy of the season. Then before the decorating is finished have each person hold back one ornament. Have each person hang their ornament saying "**May this Christmas tree bring the blessing of...**", choosing a blessing they desire for the home or the world. Now turn on the lights and sing a verse of "O Come, O come, Emmanuel" or "O Christmas Tree."

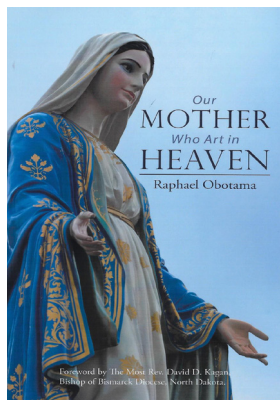

The Holy Father Speaks... The tenderness of God, as His defining trait, was the theme taken from the first reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah and the psalm where God says of Himself: "...his tenderness expands over all creatures". The image presented by Isaiah is that of a God who speaks to us as a father with His child, imitating his voice to make it as similar as possible to his. And first of all he reassures him by caressing him: "Do not be afraid, I will come to your aid". It seems that our God wants to sing us a lullaby. Our God is gifted at this. His tenderness is this: he is a father and a mother. Many times he said "But if a mother forgets her son, I will not forget you." He carries us in his deep within. He is the God who with this dialogue makes himself small to make us understand, to make us trust in him and we can tell him with the courage of Paul who changes the word and says: "Abba Father". Father...it's the tenderness of God. It is true, sometimes God raps us over the knuckles, He is great, but with His tenderness He approaches us and saves us. And this is a mystery and one of the most beautiful things: "He is the great God who makes Himself small and in His smallness He does not stop being great. And in this great dialect He is small: there is the tenderness of God. The great that makes himself small and the small that is great. Christmas helps us to understand this: in that manger... the little God. God not only helps us, but He also makes us promises of joy, of a great harvest, to help us move forward. God is not just father but a Dad.

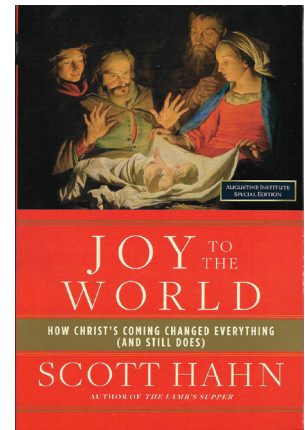
JOY TO THE WORLD

FEAST OF JOHN, APOSTLE AND EVANGELIST

Time to see the light

Today is a day to celebrate the unique perspective on Jesus the writings of John have to offer. In particular, light and darkness. John sees Jesus as the light of the world, and so it is customary to light candles on this day. As the evening falls today, light a candle and say a favorite prayer in honor of the One who said, "I have come as light into the world" (John 12:46).

Stand up for the least of these

No sooner do we celebrate the birth of one baby when the Bible recalls the slaughter of other babies. Like the infant Moses before him, the Messiah escapes to Egypt with his family. Let's not look the other way as this reading comes up each year, but let it be a reminder: Children still are victimized by adults who abuse their power—personally, professionally, or politically. Let's change that. What can you do today to be an advocate for children?

MEMORIAL OF THOMAS BECKET, BISHOP, MARTYR

Get your priorities straight

In the 12th century, Thomas Becket, the archbishop of Canterbury, stood firm against King Henry II in the latter's efforts to establish himself as absolute ruler over everything in his kingdom, including the church. Becket's refusal to submit to the king's ultimate authority cost him his life. The stakes are not always that high in the tensions between church and state, but people of faith must prepare themselves for difficult choices. Be clear about which of your loyalties are temporal—finite and fleeting—and which are eternal—everlasting and true for all time.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 2:3-11; Luke 2:22-35 (202). *"This child is destined to be a sign that will be opposed so the inner thoughts of many will be revealed."*

SIXTH DAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD

We all have a role to play

Anna is one of nine female prophets noted in the Bible. She was also a widow who spent most of her life in the work of worship and proclamation at the temple. This was unusual, because in Hebrew tradition, widows were more often looked upon as problems: Who would marry them, support their children, and feed them? In the early church, the fortunes of widows were reversed. The holy office of widows became an honored station in life. Those formally consecrated as widows became ministers of charity, freed from accountability to men as they used their own wealth, traveled, and played a vital public role in the community. How might your station in life be "consecrated"?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 2:12-17; Luke 2:36-40 (203). *"There was also a prophet, Anna, who never left the temple."*

Invest just five minutes a day, and your faith will deepen and grow—a day at a time



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
